Casting Off February ng Problems

Palm Sunday

Mk. 11:1-10; Is. 50:4-7; Ps. 22; Phil. 2:6-11; Mk. 14:1–15, 47

It's the right time to...

Welcome new possibilities into our life

1st Sunday - 22 February I set my bow in the clouds... a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. (Gn. 9:13)

Discover God as our partner in life

2nd Sunday- 1 March
If God is for us, who can be
against us? (Rm. 8:31b)

Stop thinking about faith as a collection of rules

3rd Sunday - 8 March Take these things out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace! (Jn. 2:16)

Illuminate our lives

4th Sunday- 15 March Whoever lives the truth, comes to the light... (Jn. 3:21)

Think of life as a gift of self

5th Sunday- 22 March Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a single grain. (Jn. 12:24)

Cast off fear and face our problems

Palm Sunday -29 March Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. The veil of the sanctuary was torn in two. (Mk. 15:37-38)

Realize that the tomb is empty: the Lord is alive and goes before of us...

Easter Sunday - 5 April Who will roll back the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb? (Mk. 16:3) Holy Week begins a short distance from Jerusalem—in the little town of Bethany, where Jesus had experienced friendship and deep emotion, where he had wept over the death of Lazarus, the brother of Martha and Mary. It was there that he had given the order: "Take away the stone" (Jn. 11:39) and then cried aloud: "Lazarus, come out!" (Jn. 11:43), followed by the command: "Unbind him and let him go" (Jn. 11:44). As Jesus and his companions were approaching Bethphage, a hamlet in the shadow of the Holy City, close to the Mount of Olives, Jesus said to two of his disciples: "Go into the village ahead of you and you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Until it and bring it here" (Mk. 11:2). He did not ask for a horse—an animal used in war and also by the rich and the powerful; the animal St. Paul is reputed to

have fallen from. Instead, he asked for a donkey—a despised animal used by the prophets. The donkey belongs to the class of animals mentioned first in the Book of Genesis. It was a donkey, tradition tells us, that kept the newborn Jesus company after his birth. Now it is a donkey that will bear him—the Son of David—into Jerusalem, where he will be betrayed, unjustly condemned, tortured and crucified. From the cross, Jesus will once more cry out (Mk. 15:37). Afterward, he will be buried outside the city, with a rock to cover the entrance to his tomb.

Thus Holy Week begins. During this time, let us strive to deepen our friendship with Jesus. Together with him, let us feel compassion; let us weep. Together with him, let us cry aloud when the moment comes to remove the stones, the wrappings and the chains that bind the people of this world. Together with him, let us choose to use poor means to mingle with them, sharing their toils, allowing ourselves to be liberated from the fear of death, surmounting the divisions of different Faiths. When Jesus died, "the veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom" (Mk. 15:38). Every division between God and human beings was bridged; every distance abolished, every fear dissolved, every type of death conquered. But a lot of ground still lies ahead of us on the road leading to the rediscovery of hope....
